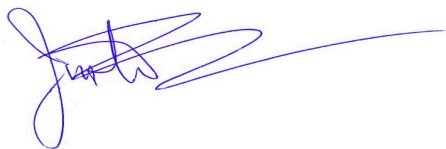

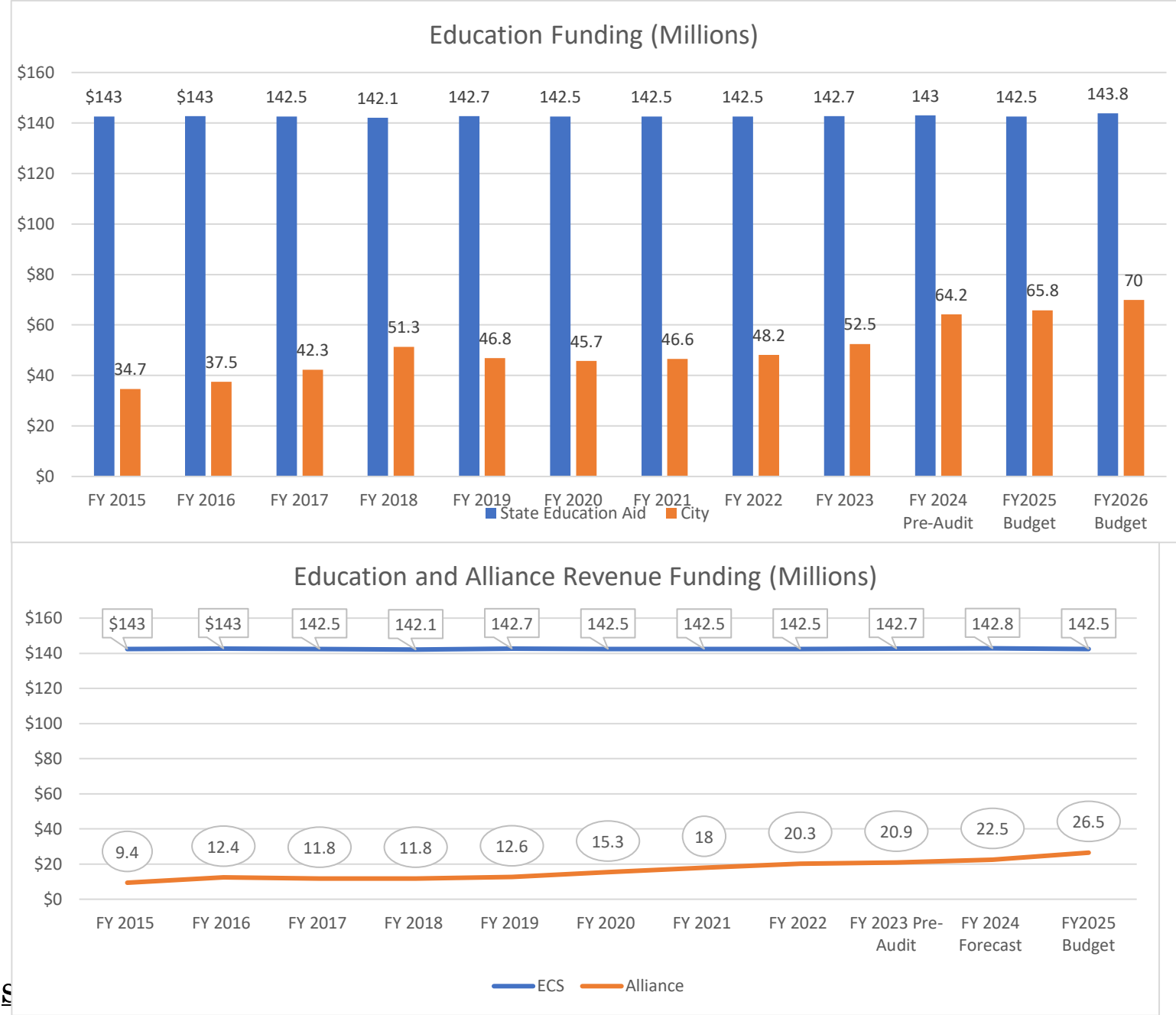

Salaries

- Actual grant support reflected to date. Potential for additional support as grants are expended.
- City support of \$3M applied to salaries
- Overtime continues to be monitored through monthly reports and meetings.
- Substitute costs continue to be monitored.

Non Personnel

- Tuition continues to be a discussion throughout the state. Negotiations are more prevalent in out of district placement due to law changes. Increase of \$400K since last report in new student placements. Due to the passing of H.B. 7163 we expect additional special education revenue in the excess cost grant. Tuition numbers for this quarter reflect Excess Cost revenue received.
- Contractual services show a better position due to negotiations with major contracts and receiving credits.
- Utility costs continue to be monitored. Review with the City of New Haven has reduced our charges. We continue to review utility costs and charges for savings and adjustments.
- Final snow removal change orders are complete, which showed an increase in cost over prior year.

- We continue to take a look at all expenses and budget lines to find cost savings that do not affect the students as well exploring other sources of non restrictive revenue
- We continue to review requests to hire through a vetting committee to ensure that the position is in line with the staffing plans
- We continue to monitor and request that all new grant applications that allow Indirect Costs be included in the application
- Tuition charges are being discussed throughout the state. While out-of-district costs have continued to rise, our revenue from tuition is increasing as well. Collaborative efforts between departments and scheduled meetings has provided more timely/current information with the costs of out-of-district placements
- We continue to work with various programs(internal/external) to support custodial and security costs created by operating these programs after school hours

Summary of Grants Revenue



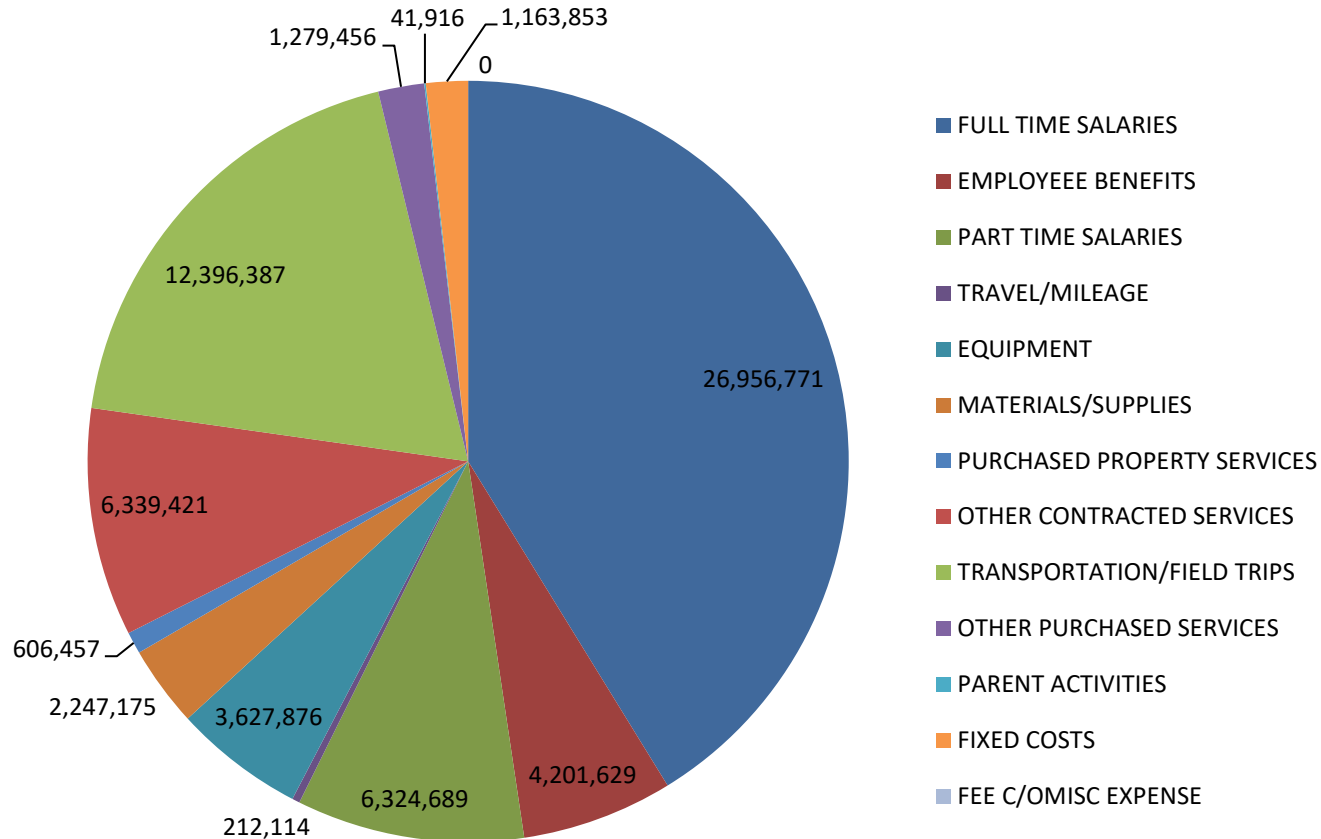
